

When looking at yield from grazed forage

across a sample of farms, we can see that there's been a steady rise from 2018 to 2020



Over the past five years, we've seen the cost of feed per cow rise at a rapid rate. Although it had started to level off slightly over the last couple of years, we know that prices are now higher than we have seen for some time. With this in mind, it has become more important than ever to maximise inputs from grazing.

Not only is it nearly always the cheapest food, but our analysis of a sample of farms also reveals that yield from grazed forage has grown steadily over the past four years. To keep identifying ways to increase contribution from forage, farms will need to invest in a grazing infrastructure.


The spring provides an opportunity to look at setting objectives, including measuring production, arowth rate and managing swards tightly to maintain quality and reduce waste. Here are some of our top tips for tackling the grazing season:

- Target sward heights: high yielders 7-10 cm, low yielders 6-8 cm, dry cows 4-6 cm
- Remove milking cows when 90% of the sward is down to 6 cm height
- Get cows to fresh grass after morning and evening milking
